What is Homelessness?

The term “homeless” includes individuals who may:

- live on the streets
- stay in a shelter, mission, abandoned building, garage or vehicle
- be “doubled up” in a one bedroom or staying with different friends or family
- be in any other non-permanent situation



Two Types of Homelessness

Intergenerational Homelessness

- Homelessness which systematically manifests in families
- Results from early childhood trauma which heavily impacts development, leading to traumatized adults who are unable to provide basic needs to their children

Chronic Homelessness

- Homelessness is a way of life
- Recurring lack of financial resources
- HUD defines as:
 - continually homeless for one year or more **OR**
 - has had 4 or more episodes of homelessness in the last 3 years

Children and Families Homelessness Numbers in 2024

Data from the 2024 point in time count in Orange County revealed that nearly 700 children and 347 families were experiencing homelessness. But the number could be significantly more, according to a report by the O.C. Grand Jury in 2023.

The point in time count in 2022 found that 722 children in O.C. were unhoused, but data tallied from the 28 O.C. school districts revealed that more than 23,000 children were unhoused.

School districts tally data based on the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, which defines homelessness as a child not having a fixed place to sleep at night.

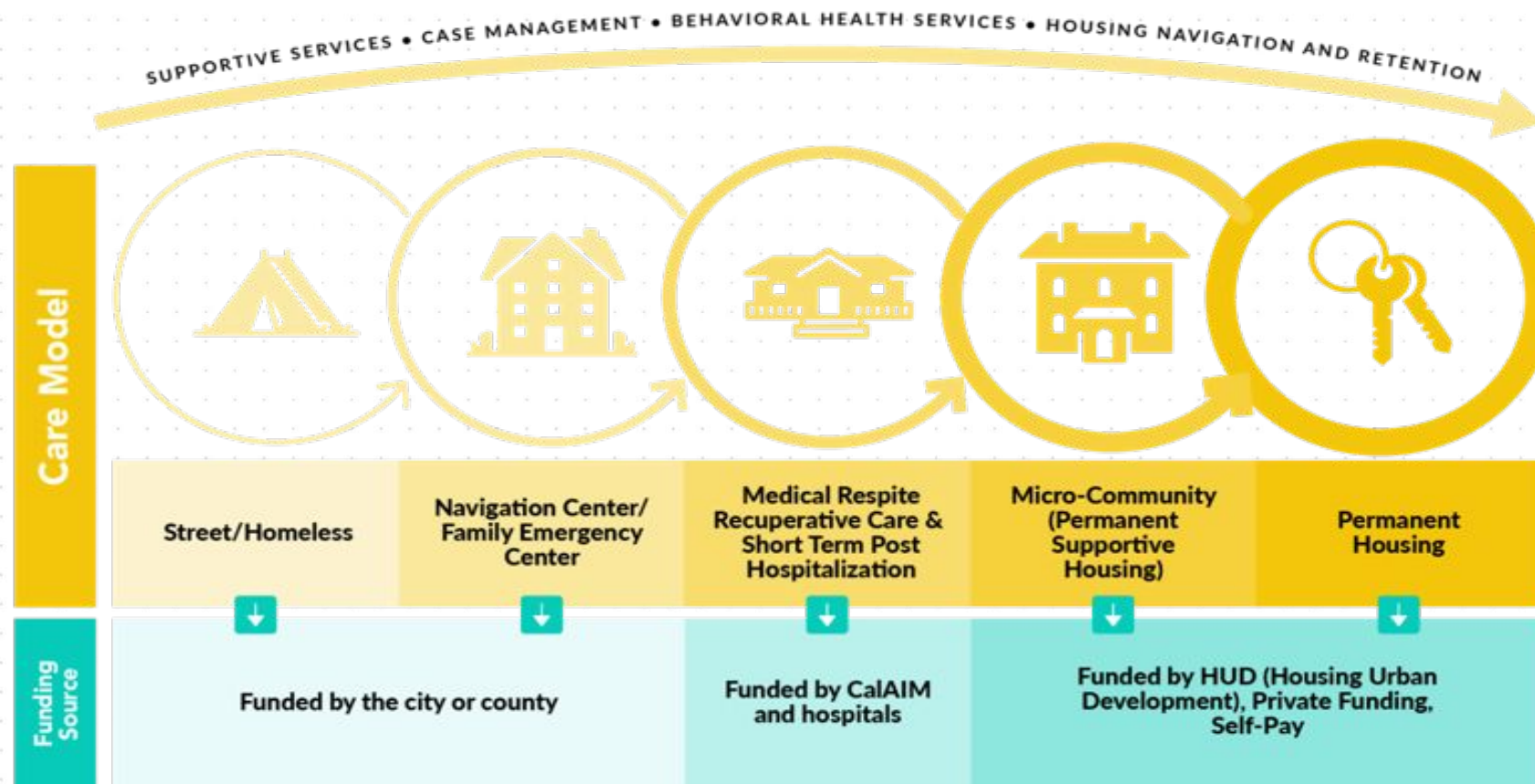

- Medicaid expansion across the U.S. is making it possible for people who lack housing to access health care, as well as receive wrap-around services that address the Social Determinants of Health (SDOH), including housing.
- In California, California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM), is a far-reaching, multiyear plan to transform California's Medi-Cal program.
- Through housing supports, independent living supports, and Enhanced Care Management, CalAIM is trying to address the SDOH, as well as the accessibility and navigation challenges brought about by the current highly fragmented system of healthcare.
- Funding is through Managed Care Plans like CalOptima Health

Face of Family Homelessness

- The lack of affordable housing and the high cost of living means families are vulnerable to become homeless. Homelessness can happen to anyone.
 - Illness, injury, or job loss
 - Loss of income
 - Families living in their car or in a motel
 - Working families, including parents working two jobs
 - Evicted from home
 - Families on waiting list and lack of available spots

Operating Model

Family Emergency Homes:

- Provide families a safe haven from homelessness where they can focus on their goals and regain housing stability
- Provide supportive services
- Aim to graduate families within 90 days

Goal: Permanent housing

Family Emergency Homes

- **THERIAULT HOUSE:** 9-bedroom property located in Stanton. Serves families with at least one child 0-5 or an adult who is pregnant. Receives referrals from the Coordinated Entry System.
- **MURPHY HOUSE:** 7-bedroom property located in unincorporated Anaheim. Receives referrals from the Coordinated Entry System.
- **PLUMERIA HOUSE:** 6-bedroom property located in Anaheim. Receives referrals from the Coordinated Entry System. Designed to accommodate children with medical needs. (Wheelchair-accessible property, including ramps inside and outside the house and roll in shower.)
- **GILBERT HOUSE:** 5-bedroom property located in Anaheim. Receives referrals from the City of Garden Grove.
- **SHAH HAPPINESS HOME:** 5-bedroom property located in Lake Forest. Receives direct referrals.

Positive Childhood Experiences (PCEs) Help Build Resilience

- Cycles of poverty and homelessness can pass from generation to generation through both physiologic and environmental factors
- Children living below the federal poverty level are 5 times more likely to experience ≥ 4 ACEs
- For each point increase in parental ACE score, odds of poor child health increases by 19%
- For each additional maternal ACE, there is an 18% increase in risk for developmental delay
- PCEs are experiences that promote safe, stable, and nurturing relationships and environments
- Both ACEs and PCEs impact housing stability: adults reporting unstable housing experience high ACEs at twice the rate of those with stable housing
- Adults reporting current stable housing experienced PCEs at double the rate of those with unstable housing

Children's Recuperative Care



- To serve children with ongoing medical needs who have been discharged from CHOC (Children's Hospital of Orange County) and whose families are identified as homeless.
- Each of these children should qualify for CalOptima's Enhanced Care Management enrollment and Community Supports funds for recuperative care.
- Opened first in the nation Children' Recuperative Care last fall.
- The home will initially house six families, and after completion of an expansion project, will house 10 families. Each family will have a private bedroom and will share the kitchen and living areas.

Nation's First Children and Families Recuperative Care

- 24/7 medical oversight
- Medical care coordination with LVN and Medical Assistant
- Education on medical compliance
- Case management
- Housing navigation
- Development and behavioral health screening
- Behavioral health counseling and connections
- Parenting education classes
- Education support services
- Enrichment programming

Children and Families Recuperative Care Admission Criteria and Eligibility

Pre-Screen:

A nurse will visit the hospital to pre-screen the family and child. They will collaborate with the social worker and the discharge nurse to ensure that the discharge process and care plan remain consistent after the child leaves the hospital.

Family:

Recuperative care is a voluntary program, and background checks will be conducted on all adults and legal guardians accompanying the child. These checks will be performed through Megan's Law and local courts.

Housing:

Maximum of 3 people in a room.

There will be one to two adults per room with one recuperative care child. If the child gets readmitted into the hospital the process is as follows:

1. The family will be able to remain in recuperative unless admission is more than 1 week then
2. The family may be placed in a short-term hotel property in the surrounding city.

List of Accepted Diagnoses:

- Asthma Exacerbations
- Closed fractures including upper and lower extremity fractures with limited mobility. Constipation requiring maintenance regimen.
- Diabetes Mellitus with strict guidance and education
- Post-allergic reaction monitoring discharged from the hospital. Pyelonephritis treated with oral antibiotics.
- Deep cuts requiring stitches. Minor burns
- Attention-deficit/hyperactive disorder (ADHD) Anxiety Disorder

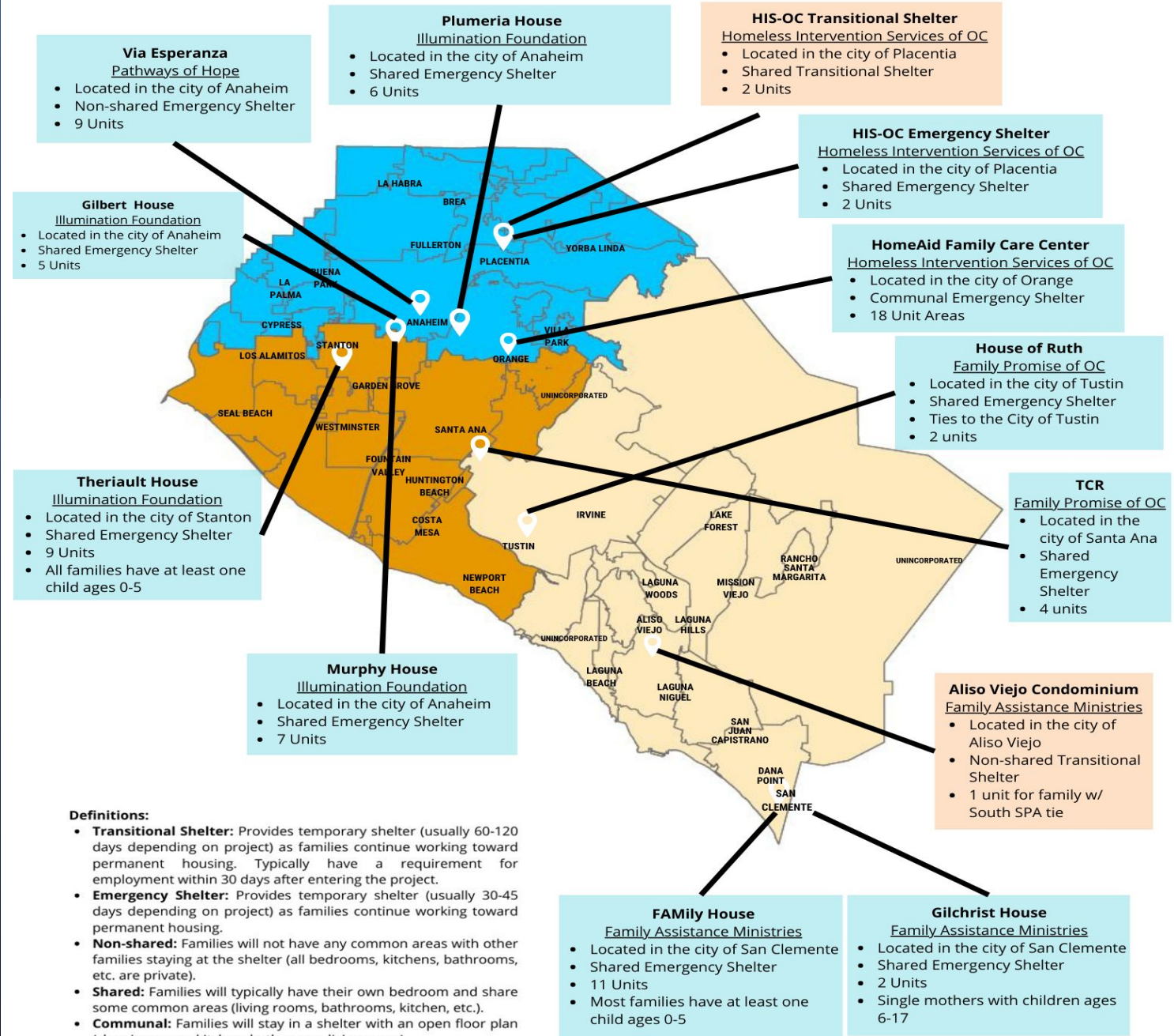

Family Shelter Map



Definitions:

- **Transitional Shelter:** Provides temporary shelter (usually 60-120 days depending on project) as families continue working toward permanent housing. Typically have a requirement for employment within 30 days after entering the project.
- **Emergency Shelter:** Provides temporary shelter (usually 30-45 days depending on project) as families continue working toward permanent housing.
- **Non-shared:** Families will not have any common areas with other families staying at the shelter (all bedrooms, kitchens, bathrooms, etc. are private).
- **Shared:** Families will typically have their own bedroom and share some common areas (living rooms, bathrooms, kitchen, etc.).
- **Communal:** Families will stay in a shelter with an open floor plan (sleeping areas, kitchen, bathrooms, living areas).

What is an Access Point?

- Access points directly assist families experiencing homelessness access and navigate the family coordinated entry system.
- Access point case managers assist families seeking resources by:
 - Assessing them for diversion and connecting them to diversion resources
 - Assessing families and adding them to the coordinated entry system
 - Assisting families with gathering documentation such as homelessness verification required to be matched to shelter or housing resources
 - Advocating for families in FCES "match meetings" during which families are matched to housing opportunities in accordance with prioritization policies
 - Connecting clients with additional resources such as ID waivers and other resource referrals
- Access points accomplish this work by meeting with their clients weekly while they are in the family coordinated entry system.

Illumination Foundation's FCES Access Point

- Illumination Foundation's family Coordinated Entry System Access Point is the Anaheim Service Center (ASC) located at 883 S. Anaheim Blvd, Anaheim, CA 92805.
- Appointments are preferred, but walk-ins are accepted.
- Beyond assistance with family Coordinated Entry System access, Anaheim Service Center staff can refer to any available internal homelessness prevention or rapid rehousing resources.
- The Anaheim Service Center also includes an on-site food pantry for free groceries.



Wrap-Around Services

- Case Management
- Housing Navigation
- Primary Care and Behavioral Health Services - Referrals to CHOC for primary care services
- Developmental Screening
- Parent Education
- Educational Support
- Enrichment Programming
- Income planning including benefits acquisition, referrals to workforce readiness agencies, direct assistance with resume preparation and job search, and budgeting
- Referrals to Enhanced Care Management for Medi-Cal (CalAIM) enrolled households to provide medical coordination services



Monique and Stephanie found a safe place for their kids to recover

Our children's recuperative care is a refuge for families like Monique and her 11-month-old daughter who was suffering with respiratory problems. The Children and Families Recuperative Care ensured they had a safe place to go during their transition from the hospital to housing.

Another grateful family is that of Stephanie and her 8-year-old son, Brandon. They were able to transfer to the children's recuperative care home from our Santa Ana Navigation Center after Brandon had a seizure. He was referred to CHOC and diagnosed with epilepsy. He's now on medication and stable.

Erin's Journey to Success

Erin, a single mother of three, found herself at a crossroads when her partner, the father of her two youngest, abandoned her. Seeking refuge from his substance use and violent tendencies, she found a safe haven at Illumination Foundation's Bob Murphy House Family Emergency Home. The Children and Families Program staff welcomed Erin with open arms, providing her with not only shelter but also a renewed sense of hope. During her stay, Erin's dedicated housing navigator worked tirelessly to secure a housing voucher for her. The day they turned the key to their new home was filled with tears of joy and gratitude.

Erin remains deeply thankful for the Illumination Foundation staff who embraced her during her darkest times, forming bonds that continue to inspire her journey.

Maria's New Beginning

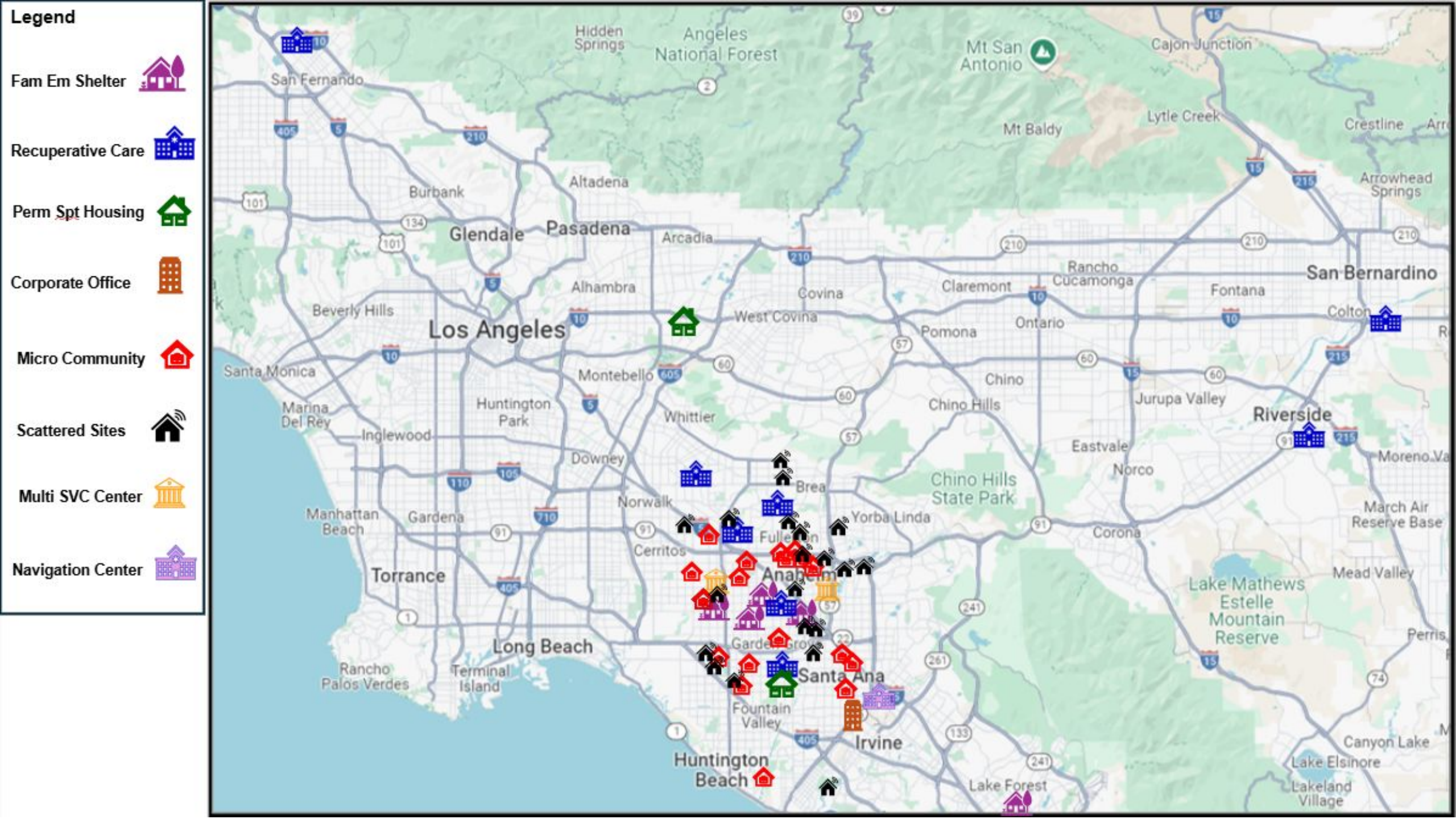
